Seeds of Invention

In an effort to help teachers make history come alive for their students, *TAHSC* has partnered with the South Carolina Cotton Museum and J&J Custom Cabinets to create 75 working replica cotton gin models. These tabletop models are based on the design patented to Eli Whitney on March 14, 1794. Contrary to popular belief, Eli Whitney did not invent the first cotton gin, but rather proposed a new design, which contained these three distinct features:

1) wire teeth on one cylinder to tear seeds from the lint; 2) turning brushes on the other cylinder to sweep the cotton out of the teeth; and 3) a slotted guard above the cylinders to sift out loosened seeds.



The *TAHSC* Cotton Gin really works!

These replica gin models give students a chance to work closely with this important invention that changed American history.
